HERZL MEMORIAL PARK 1909

*A resting place for loved ones
founded by
Herzl Congregation of Seattle*

Small stones on or near headstones are visual signs
that loved ones have visited.

RICHMOND HIGHLANDS RECREATION CENTER 1911 ~ 1950

*From two locations,
it has served our community*

Today, the building is the home of the
City of Shoreline's community recreation program.

RICHMOND MASONIC LODGE 1922

*Built for local Masons,
the Lodge was open to all
for social events*

Currently, it is the home of Richmond Highlands Rainbow
for Girls, Job's Daughters, and the Order of the Amaranth.

RONALD METHODIST CHURCH 1909 ~ 1925 ~ 1967

*The congregation built three churches
all in Richmond Highlands*

The original 1922 church bell rang at 175th & Linden until
reinstalled at the Aurora location in 1938 and rededicated in
1970 following the construction of the newest church.

RONALD SCHOOL 1906 ~ 1912

*A community was started
with the creation of a school*

Named for Judge James T. Ronald, the school building
became the Shoreline Historical Museum in 1976.





RICHMOND MASONIC LODGE

- 1921 Meeting held to plan establishment of Richmond Lodge at 185th and Linden Avenue North
- 1922 First meeting held in new building
- 1943 Lodge members serving in the military during World War II were notified that their dues were waived for the war's duration
- 1972 Richmond Masons marked 50th anniversary and became sole owner of lodge after many years of joint ownership with Eastern Star
- 1996 Haller Lake Lodge consolidated with Richmond Lodge to become Richmond-Haller Lake Lodge #248

RONALD METHODIST CHURCH

- 1909 Church received 12 adults and two young people into its faith; first church was constructed at N. 175th and Linden Avenue North
- 1924 Land was purchased on Aurora near N. 180th to meet the needs of an expanding congregation; new Gothic-style brick church completed and dedicated in 1925
- 1955 Educational wing containing chapel, classrooms, social hall, choir room, and offices constructed
- 1967 First services held in third and existing church
- 1999 Ronald Methodist Church celebrated its 90th anniversary

2 Location: N. 180th and Aurora Avenue North
Granite Marker: Near church sign on Aurora Avenue N.

RONALD SCHOOL


- 1906 One-room grade school constructed on N. 175th site near Linden Avenue North; second room added in 1910
- 1912 At same location, two-story brick school replaced original structure to provide room for growing student population
- 1926 Building expanded adding six rooms to the west
- 1970 Last class graduated; Ronald School closed due to funding shortages
- 1976 Shoreline School District founded Shoreline Historical Museum at Ronald School site as a U.S. Bicentennial project



RICHMOND HIGHLANDS RECREATION CENTER

- 1911 Women's Richmond Highlands Progressive Club built community clubhouse west of original Ronald School
- 1919 Community clubhouse sold to school district for expansion of facility to include lunchroom/kitchen and auditorium/gymnasium
- 1950 Greater Richmond Community Club formally organized and collected funds to relocate facility to N. 167th & Fremont Avenue North and renovate building; King County agreed to lease and operate recreation center
- 1953 Shoreline School District transferred leased center property to King County in exchange for paving road in Hamlin Park
- 1997 King County conveyed ownership of center to City of Shoreline for public use

HERZL MEMORIAL PARK

- 1909 Original land purchased on Dayton Avenue North near N. 165th and Carlyle Hall Road
- 1937 L. N. Rosenbaum donated Fani Rosenbaum Chapel to honor his mother; Marcus Priteca, a locally and nationally recognized architect, designed chapel with concrete dome and acoustical qualities
- 1993 Chapel addition and other cemetery renovations completed from 1993 through 1999 under direction of the Herzl Memorial Park Committee, John Cohn, President

5 Location: N. 165th & Carlyle Hall on Dayton Avenue North

These existing community facilities were selected for their long historical contribution. Granite markers have been installed at each location.

Walking to historic sites is encouraged. Parking is also available at the Shoreline Historical Museum and at most sites. Please be mindful that some of these landmarks are on private property.
