SEPA analysis was also conducted for the adoption of the original Development Code on 6/12/00, and subsequent non-exempt amendments to the Development Code.

SEPA analysis is conducted every year on the batch of Development Code amendments with the latest SEPA DNS being issued for the 2018 Batch on October 11, 2018.

The City contains areas of slopes over 40 percent in some areas, especially on the western most and eastern most portions of the City.

c. What general types of soils are found on the site (for example, clay, sand, gravel, peat, muck)? If you know the classification of agricultural soils, specify them and note any agricultural land of long-term commercial significance and whether the proposal results in removing any of these soils.

Recent geologic mapping of King County (Booth and Wisler, 2006) identifies the City as being underlain primarily by glacially derived or glacially overridden soils.

d. Are there surface indications or history of unstable soils in the immediate vicinity? If so, describe.

Landslide hazard areas within the City of Shoreline occur predominantly along the western perimeter of the city, where the highlands descend to Puget Sound, or within steeply incised natural drainages, such as Boeing and McAleer Creeks.

e. Describe the purpose, type, total area, and approximate quantities and total affected area of any filling, excavation, and grading proposed. Indicate source of fill.

This proposal is not site specific.

f. Could erosion occur as a result of clearing, construction, or use? If so, generally describe.

To address erosion and sedimentation impacts, grading and stormwater codes of agencies and municipalities require preparation of a SWPPP before grading permits are issued. Such plans are prepared based upon the requirements of the adopted Surface Water Design Manual. If the area of ground disturbance exceeds one acre, then a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit is also required. Projects seeking NPDES permit coverage typically conform to the conditions of the Department of Ecology's (Ecology) Construction Stormwater General Permit (CSWGP), which includes implementation of an SWPPP and protocols for monitoring site discharges for compliance with water quality standards.

Minimum requirements and best management practices (BMPs) for SWPPP s are established by the Washington State Department of Ecology in the Stormwater Management Manual for Western Washington (Stormwater Manual; Ecology, 2012); municipalities typically adopt these minimum requirements and BMP design standards, or their equivalents, as part of their stormwater management requirements for site development. The City of Shoreline has adopted the Stormwater Manual and the Low Impact Technical Guidance Manual for Puget Sound (LID Manual; Washington State University and Puget Sound Partnership, 2012). The City also encourages the use of emerging technologies that are part of the Washington Department of Ecology's Technology Assessment Protocol (TAPE). These BMPs, together with the erosion and sedimentation control BMPs of the Stormwater Manual, constitute the BAS for prevention of erosion and the treatment of sediment-laden runoff.

Amendments in the 2020 batch include language that addresses Hardscape. A private request is suggesting that allowable percentage of hardscape be increased for K through 12 schools to support development of more artificial turf fields and increased parking and circulation areas.

g. About what percent of the site will be covered with impervious surfaces after project construction (for example, asphalt or buildings)?

This is a non-project action. The City has regulations about how much a site may be covered by buildings and hardscape. These regulations are based on the zoning of a parcel.

h. Proposed measures to reduce or control erosion, or other impacts to the earth, if any:

The City currently regulates surface water, stormwater, and erosion with the Department of Ecology Stormwater Manual for Western Washington and the Engineering Development Manual.

20.20.018 – emergency temporary shelters – The proposed amendment adds Emergency Temporary Shelter to SMC 20.20 – Definitions. This would allow severe weather shelters to be activated on an intermittent basis, such as when temperatures are predicted to fall below freezing.

20.20.028 – Junk vehicles - The proposed amendment to the definition of junk vehicle will allow the City's Customer Response Team and the Police Department to determine

when a vehicle qualifies for a junk vehicle. Junk vehicles are regulated in SMC 20.30.750 and the section outlines the process of abating the nuisance.

20.50.020(1) and 20.50.020(2) - Exempt schools from hardscape requirement - This amendment exempts schools from hardscape requirements. Schools in Shoreline are primarily developed on land zoned R-6 which is intended for single-family residential uses. As such, the building coverage and hardscape requirements are low when building elementary, middle, and high schools in the R-6 zone. New or redeveloped schools are limited to 35% building coverage and 50% total hardscape. In addition, schools have been exchanging grass playfields for artificial turf fields which allow more opportunities for recreation on a year-round basis, something the city needs for schools and league sports. Because turf is calculated toward total hardscape, many times, the school cannot make improvements and meet the City's hardscape requirements. This amendment will allow the schools to provide all the necessary elements of a school (parking, circulation, sport courts, turf fields, and pathways) while also complying with the City's strict stormwater codes.

20.50.020(B) and (4) - Density Exceptions - This is a privately initiated amendment that seeks to add an additional separate living unit (Not an ADU) on parcels zoned R-4 through R-48 if certain conditions are met. The intent of the amendment is to add density to larger single-family lots if the second dwelling is smaller and less intrusive to the neighborhood. The amendment will also allow parking reductions if within a 1/2 mile from light rail stations or electric vehicle charging facilities are installed.

The proposed 2020 Batch will not deplete natural resources.

Proposed measures to protect or conserve energy and natural resources are:

There are one new code amendments to protect or conserve energy and natural resources. Amendment 15 expands the city's EV parking requirements by expanding the regulations to single-family and commercial parking areas. These regulations will provide more EV charging facilities throughout the city when new development occurs.

How would the proposal be likely to use or affect environmentally sensitive areas or areas designated (or eligible or under study) for governmental protection; such as parks, wilderness, wild and scenic rivers, threatened or endangered species habitat, historic or cultural sites, wetlands, floodplains, or prime farmlands?

There are no proposed code amendments to the Critical Area Ordinance or amendments that will affect parks, wilderness, wild and scenic rivers, threatened or endangered species habitat, historic or cultural sites, wetlands, floodplains, or prime farmlands in the 2020 Batch. The City adopted new floodplain regulations in July. One amendment clarifies that stream buffers are calculated on both sides of the stream.

The current Development Code will continue to protect resources and reduce critical area impacts.
